REMEMBERING Dr. Gerald G. Woodruff, Jr. founding Director Emeritus

DR. GERALD G. WOODRUFF, JR. (1928 - 2020)

r. Gerald Woodruff, Jr., loved his community and his community loved him back. He served Calhoun County as a pediatrician for over 50 years. For many families, he cared for up to three to four generations of patients. He was a generous multi-talented individual who excelled at just about anything he put his mind to do. Dr. Woodruff was also a history buff. A great example of this is his family home, which was originally built by Anniston's founder, Sam Noble. Built in 1882 on

Woodstock Avenue, it was scheduled to be demolished in the 1960's to make room for the new Anniston High School. Through his determination and imagination, he devised a plan to divide the house in half and transport it from Woodstock to its present location in Booger Hollow just off of Coleman Road. No small feat.

Dr. Woodruff loved to paint, particularly water colors. He gave away many paintings as gifts and some were used as art for his original Christmas cards. He also loved college football, particularly when his beloved Crimson Tide took the field.

In 1963, Dr. Woodruff took charge of the oral vaccine program in the fight against polio in Calhoun County. Thousands of residents lined up to get im-

munized with a sugar cube containing the vaccine. That very same year, Dr. Woodruff also found time to become an active member of the very first Board of Directors of the Anniston Academy (now The Donoho School). On July 30, 2020,

Dr. Woodruff's passing was mourned by many. Among his many distinctions we want to pay special tribute to his wise leadership and also recognize that he was the last surviving member of the founding Board of Directors for what we all now know and love as The Donoho School.

How to Rethink, Redesign, and Reimagine in 2020 David J. Noone



heard the jokes, and voiced our displeasure about the year 2020. We have also all had disappointments, anxieties,

and at times experienced the solitude that 2020 brought. This past year has thrown things at us we could never have imagined and made us rethink almost everything we do. The challenges seemed daunting. Out of this avalanche of change and uncertainty, however, have emerged new skills, new opportunities, and in many cases redesigned "traditions" that not only survived 2020 but came out better, stronger, and more meaningful. So instead of lamenting what could have been, let's talk about what was and how it has made Donoho a better place.

The first great "success" in the time of COVID-19 was the class of 2020 graduation. Thrust into the time of immense uncertainty and extreme anxiety, this event was well-thought-out and purposeful in its planning, almost perfect in its execution, and, to be honest, beautiful and meaningful to experience. For those unaware, it was held outdoors on Lentz Field, live-streamed, and pro-



fessionally recorded. It featured parents presenting diplomas, the valedictorian's speech live from China, and a beautiful sunset as the seniors graduated, metaphorically symbolizing that their time as students had ended and their new role as alumni had begun. So powerful, beautiful, and meaningful was this "new" graduation that it impacted how we think about the ceremony and may lead to lasting changes. A little lemonade was made.



The second great "success" was our vastly-increased understanding of virtual learning and the huge strides we have made in both our ability to go virtual and the quality of our virtual product. To say we were caught unaware and unprepared in the spring would be an understatement, and at times we did struggle along with our parents and students. We had to set aside lofty goals and instead focus primarily on trying to maintain a sense of normalcy in a world turned upside down. This summer was spent, however, refining, expanding, and better organizing our virtual learning should it be needed again. Academic rigor was re-established and a purposeful, goal-oriented program of instruction was created and is ready for use if needed again in the future. This process brought out the very best of the admin-



istration and the faculty, rejuvenated our belief in ourselves as educators, and put us in a position to be adaptable in the future without any loss of our educational focus. A little more lemonade was made.

The third great "success" is really the combined weight of a myriad of little changes that have proven to be more impactful and productive than its predecessors. Open house was broken into pieces for social distancing, but what we found is the event allowed for real conversations between students, parents, and teachers and offered a much better start to the school year. A new daily schedule in the middle and upper schools to facilitate distancing around lunch has proved to be a great change, allowing for a more meaningful advisory time and a better pacing to the school day as a whole. The hiring of a school nurse and a counselor/language professional for the lower school was born out of necessity but exposed why those positions should have been filled long ago. This list of positives that has emerged from the time of COVID-19 goes on and on, and it will have a meaningful impact once the pandemic is behind us. Again, more lemonade was made.

Yes, the year 2020 was and is a difficult time. There are things we cannot do that we wish we could. But all great difficulties call for a new outlook, new approaches, and a renewed commitment to your core beliefs. Great organizations not only rise to meet these challenges but emerge stronger and better when they have passed. Donoho has proven to be such an organization.

Brent earned his undergraduate and graduate degrees at Jacksonville State University in mathematics and did post graduate work in mathematics and engineering management at the University of Alabama, Huntsville. He currently lives in Williamsburg,Virginia.

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day

entail? I am a NASA researcher and have been for more than 30 years. I spent the first 13 years of my career at Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama and then moved to Virginia to work at Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia, where I presently work on a project related to inflatable decelerators - a type of heat shield - for atmospheric re-entry. In addition, I have taught at the college level for more than 25 years. Presently, I am an Visiting Assistant Professor for the College of William & Mary, and an Adjunct Professor for the University of Maryland and Saint Leo University. A typical day for me (prior to the coronavirus situation) would consist of teaching a class at William & Mary in the morning, traveling to Langley Research Center to do my NASA work, taking my lunch break to teach a math class to Airmen at Langley Air Force Base for Saint Leo University, finishing the day with NASA and then going home to teach a class for the University of Maryland online. I know it sounds

like a lot, but I enjoy it. In my spare time, I still love writing and telling stories. I wrote a weekly column for about ten years, and I have cut it back to once a month. Another hobby I enjoy is telling true stories on stage.

How has your life journey been influenced by your time at Donoho? I don't know how to answer this question. I will simply say that what I am, who I love, and the sweetest memories I've ever known all involve The Donoho School in some way. I always say, "I finished in the "Top 25" of my graduating class – my children graduated from a high school of 1000+ students, so it sounds impressive. I think my graduation class at Donoho was around 46 to 50 – so 25th or possibly 26th wasn't really that impressive. It's all in how you tell the story... My wife, Marian Morrow Heard '81 also graduated from Donoho, as well as my brother Bud '75 (Anniston Academy).

What are some words of wisdom you'd like to share with current Donoho students? My words of wisdom – "Be kind to everyone, love everyone, appreciate your parents and bust your ass doing your best - because it does matter." Also, have a good time and help everybody you can.

Kidada received his B.S. in Biology from Morehouse College in 1996 and his M.S. from UAB in Healthcare Administration and Business in 2008. He lives in Vestavia Hills, Alabama.

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day entail? I'm Chief Operating Officer for Princeton Baptist Medical Center, a 505-bed acute care hospital in downtown Birmingham. Trust me, there's no "typical day" in healthcare leadership, particularly in the midst of a pandemic. My day usually starts at 5:30 AM. Usually, the first thing I do is review my calendar for both the current and next day. I then prioritize how I want to approach all of the necessary "to dos." I do this knowing full well that there's better than a 95%+ chance my day will be completely disrupted by some unexpected occurrence prompting immediate attention and thus the likelihood of my

Allison earned her undergraduate degree at The University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa. Then she went to medical school at UAB. She lives in Birmingham, Alabama.

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day entail? I am currently a physician, a neonatologist on faculty at University of Alabama School of Medicine. My typical day as a full time working mom of 3 is pretty full! My schedule is rather variable week to week depending on where I am seeing patients, because our group provides coverage for 6 different NICUs in the Birmingham metro area. On the mornings when I do not have an early administrative meeting, I am able to start the day with getting my first, third, and sixth grader off to school. I typically then spend the next hour or two knocking out administrative and educational tasks such as drafting policies, updating quality improvement initiatives in our various NICUs or working on educational materials. Once those tasks are complete, I go into whatever unit I am covering to round, see patients, speak with families and chart. Depending on the day, that usually occupies me until late in the afternoon and sometimes into the night if I happen to be on call. Many days I have educational or administrative meetings that I attend in the afternoon, because I serve on various committees and fulfill administrative roles in several of the hospitals where I see patients. On the days when I am not on night call, I sign out to my partners at 5 PM to cover my patients which leaves me free to shuttle my 12 year old to tennis, and (pre-covid) my 8 year old to guitar and swimming, and my 6 year old daughter

day progressing as planned is essentially none. I still plan things out everyday, though. After all, a man can dream, right? The "regular" irregularity is what makes my job both challenging and rewarding. While I do savor the few days when things progress as planned, the same routine each day would drive me insane.

How has your life journey been influenced by your time at Donoho? I learned valuable study habits which made my first few years of college less challenging in comparison to what I saw amongst my then peers. Exceptional performance in college set me on a course for immediate acceptance into postgraduate programs and laid the foundation for my development as a professional.

What are some words of wisdom you'd like to share with current Donoho students? Adulthood will be here in due time. Enjoy your youth and your relatively carefree times while you can. Also, take full advantage of the rich education you're blessed to be a part of.

to ukulele and soccer. Then it is home to do homework, dinner and get everyone ready for the next day. Once all the kids are in bed, I tend to be a night owl and stay up working another hour or two on whatever emails, lectures, documents I didn't finish earlier in the day. I do try to take an hour or so, either early in the morning or sneak it in later afternoon when possible, to do some type of exercise –usually running, pilates, or a ride on my peloton. That is necessary for my sanity!

What are some words of wisdom you'd like to share with current Donoho students? I encourage the students to not be afraid to try something new or that makes them uncomfortable-whether that is a new sport, a class that they would normally not sign up for, or participating in the school play. Some of the things I most enjoyed in high school and college were not what I thought I had "planned." That probably explains why my major in college was French even though I ended up going to medical school, but that also allowed me to live abroad with a host family and have experiences I would not have had otherwise.

What is your favorite Donoho tradition? My favorite Donoho tradition is one that I think, sadly, is no longer. As a member of the Varsity Volleyball team, every summer the entire team traveled to Destin, Florida, for practices and team bonding before the season started. Fourteen girls and 4 (brave) adults all piled into 3 condos for one week. We had a one mile run on the beach every morning at 6 AM and countless card games, movies and heart to hearts each night. Some of my fondest memories and stories about high school include that trip, and it created friendships that have lasted until this day.

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day entail? This month, I'm embarking on a new adventure as a Commercial Real Estate Professional in North Carolina, but I spent a decade working in broadcast media for NBCUniversal in the New York City area, most recently as a producer in the Olympics and Features Unit of the NBC Sports Group. If I've learned anything from this year, it's that the grit developed in those formative years as a Falcon is now proving to be of paramount importance. So much that we perceived as "normal" has been upended entirely this year, and I'm so thankful for the tough lessons on flexibility and resilience that came from my 6 years at Donoho.

How has your life journey been influenced by your time at Donoho? As a high school athlete, I played a role on a team who experienced a winless season and a team who won a state championship. In my time at Donoho, we were blessed to taste victory and defeat in equal measure, and I'd like to think that imparted a realistic viewpoint regarding the opportunities one faces as life plays out. You're never going to do it perfectly, but you can always get back up and try again.

What are some words of wisdom you'd like to share with current Donoho students? Something I've noted in the years since high school is that "adults" don't actually have all the answers to life. When you enter each new decade, you're not handed a cheat sheet or pointed to a shortcut. For better or worse, we're all still figuring things out. Even the most successful members of society are seeking advice, trying things, noting what works, and hoping to learn from shortcomings. Being okay with the idea that you never stop learning and that being wrong can lead to greater insights is something I wish I'd known sooner. Keeping that in mind, I'd recommend current students experiment with what works for them and be open for evaluation and reflection. The Obstacle is the Way by Ryan Holiday is a book I recommend everyone read. He explores this theme of exploration and reinvention even among the greatest minds in history. From Abraham Lincoln and Winston Churchill to Marcus Aurelius, each person that lives gets a chance to make the most of the opportunities presented to them.

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day entail? I now work at Lord, Abbett & Co. as an Investment Analyst on the firm's Value Equities team. Dr. Jason Cook '99

he Donoho School selects an Alumnus/Alumna of the Year annually to recognize a graduate who has distinguished himself/herself through achievements since graduating from Donoho. Past recipients have excelled in business, academia, medicine, and service. Our 57 past recipients epitomize the values of our mission, and we are very proud to announce this year's recipient, Dr. Jason Cook, '99.

While at Donoho, Dr. Cook excelled in academics as the Salutatorian, Reynolds Renaissance Award recipient, National Merit Scholar, Eagle Scout, among many other club involvements. He was also on the varsity soccer team all four years and senior year was team captain and all-county. After Donoho, he attended The University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee, where he graduated magna cum laude in 2003 with a B.A. in Religion. He then continued his studies at the University of Alabama School of Medicine in Birmingham receiving his M.D. in 2007. Dr. Cook received the Family Medicine Award Mountain Area Health Education Center, Asheville, NC and completed his residency in Family Medicine in 2010.

Dr. Cook is currently a partner with The Family Health Centers in Asheville, North Carolina, where he practices primary care and headache medicine. He is the founder and CEO of Olfax Medical, a medical device startup developing nasally administered therapies for migraine and other disease processes. Dr. Cook spent four years serving the rural populations of North Carolina as a member of the National Health Service Corps from 2010-2014, then began his current practice with The Family Health Centers in 2014. In 2015, he founded The Family Health Centers Headache Clinic, where he provides both primary care and specialty headache care for thousands of patients every year. He is a Clinical Instructor of Family Medicine for the University of North Carolina School of Medicine where he lectures on advanced headache management to medical students and residents. He has been a Community Faculty member for the MAHEC Family Medicine Residency Program and received the Community Faculty Award in 2013. He served on the Board of Directors for the North Carolina Academy of Family Physicians from 2014-2018. Dr. Cook has also served as a volunteer physician since 2007 at the local medical society's free clinic.







Belk Scholar


Currently a Neuroscience major with a minor in French. Sarah is volunteering at the COVID-19 testing site on campus.
