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



New Classroom Furniture


JASE ALDERMAN MEMORIAL FUND



Due to the pandemic, the opportunities were limited or non-existent the previous two years. We were so happy to be able to travel again with our freshman in February! As in years past, the freshmen class had the opportunity to travel to Washington, DC. Incredible opportunities were offered for these students to learn about the history of our nation. Throughout the week, students enjoyed walking tours of the city which included seeing the United States Capitol, Library of Congress, and Supreme Court Buildings. While students enjoyed walking along the streets of DC, this historical trip would not be complete without visiting the National Mall which includes plenty of monuments and Smithsonian museums.





Thankfully the city was not very crowded during their visit, so our students were able to

enjoy visiting the monuments and museums with limited capacity. They were able to watch the sunset at the World War II Memorial, enjoy an early morning tours of the Lincoln, Vietnam, and Korean War Memorials, and look at several different artifacts in the American History Museum, Museum of the Bible, Natural History Museum, and the National Museum of African American History and Culture.

Intersession is a great opportunity to explore many interesting jobs. Whether it is a profession you

plan on pursuing in college, or just something that interests you, intersession allows you to get a first look and many "hands on" experiences with the job. For Olivia's senior year, she chose to shadow the Anniston Police Department crime lab. She was able to go out in the field and be a part of real, small investigations. She also got to take photos in the lab of evidence, use chemicals to make fingerprints show up, and much more.

Olivia says, "Job shadowing is a great opportunity if you are stuck on what you think you want to be when you want to grow up. I took a forensics class when I was a senior at Donoho and found myself being very interested in forensic science and wanting to learn more. At first, I was intimidated due to the fact that I had never worked in an environment like a crime lab. Once I got there, I immediately felt

more confident and realized that if you are interested in something enough, it is not a tough job."

For any students thinking about job shadowing for intersession, she highly recommends the crime lab and would definitely do it again.





Nic Thompson '24 Job Shadow: Tinsley Performance

Nic was able to job shadow at Tinsley Performance, a strength and conditioning facility in

Pelham, AL. The owner of this facility is Cal Tinsley who earned his degree in Human Performance at the University of Alabama. Nic said that he chose this for Intersession because he loves dealing with sports and sports medicine. According to Nic, the experience gave him the opportunity to learn different types of injuries dealing with baseball pitchers, their certain arm injuries, and how they recover from them. He was able to evaluate kids and learn about the injuries they have as well as how to assist them in their rehabilitation.

Nic shared, "I got there at 7am to work with professional athletes on rehab and regaining strength in their arms. My favorite part of

job shadowing at TP was being able to catch a bullpen from Atlanta Braves Reliever Jackson Stephens and Red Sox Starter Garret Whitlock. I would definitely do this again because of the experience of being with professional athletes, learning about their injuries, and seeing how to help them."







MCDOWELL

Camp McDowell is a long-standing Donoho sixth grade tradition. However, two recent sixth grade classes were unable to attend overnight camp due to COVID restrictions. In the Spring of 2022, we had a unique learning experience where sixth, seventh, and eighth graders participated together at The Camp McDowell Environmental Center.

Camp McDowell is more than just a walk in the woods. There is a variety of instruction and activities that take place in an outdoor classroom. Students are able to see and feel what they are taught as they interact among forests, canyons, and streams. Students are equipped with lessons that range from respecting the environment, team building, observing reptiles and amphibians, stream studies, and survival skills. What a great experience with outdoor learning, and we cannot wait to return this spring for our next Camp McDowell experience with our sixth graders.



Our fifth graders returned to Camp McDowell Farm School last April. Students were able to plant and harvest food, gather eggs from the chicken coop, observe and interact with the pigs, milk a goat, and have a farm-to-table experience. All meals are served family style, which involves sharing, serving, and cleaning-up, and students also measured their food waste at the end of each meal. Ending the visit with a barn dance was a highlight of the trip. Farm School is always an amazing outdoor learning experience for our students!

Our organic garden will be up and running fully by spring, and Engineering Design will have solved another problem on campus. If you

Kirklyn Pope Simonton '88

Kirklyn earned her bachelor's degree at Randolph College in Lynchburg, Virginia. She currently lives in Greenwood Village, Colorado with her husband and three children.

What are you most proud of from your Donoho experience?

I am most proud that I received an education surrounded by people that continue to thrive and make the world a better place today. Although I do not keep in touch directly with everyone, thanks to social media, I see how there

are philanthropists, doctors, lawyers, coaches...now grandparents, aunts, uncles, and true friends. I do not recall one self-centered peer in my graduating class.

What is your current position and how did Donoho prepare you for your career?

I am currently the National Director of Operations and Development for a nonprofit based in Centennial, Colorado. Our focus is therapeutic play for children with long-term and life-threatening diseases through our Bags of Fun program. The core values of integrity and compassion that I learned while serving on the Donoho Honor Council in 1988, are still essential in my job today.

What is something at Donoho that you absolutely loved being a part of?

Mrs. Morgan's Art Club. It was a safe place to express myself artistically, even though I was not a gifted artist. This club made me feel like a true artist, which led me to study art in college.

What is your favorite Donoho tradition?

The talent show. In the 1980s, everyone participated and there was no exclusivity or divisiveness.

Any advice you would give current Donoho students and families?

Embrace education as a whole and not just academic books. Learn from your peers, your teachers, and your mentors. Be gracious and let these people know how much you appreciate them. Gratitude will take you further in life than comparing yourself, your grades, or your sports to others.

Evan earned his bachelor of science degree in Neuroscience with a minor in Computer Science at Vanderbilt University. Then he went to Emory School of Medicine for his medical degree with his Internship and Ophthalmology residency at Tulane University School of Medicine. Evan completed his fellowship in Cornea, Cataract, and Refractive Surgery at Price Vision Group. He currently lives in Atlanta, Georgia with his wife Jade Childers Schoenberg '00 and their daughters.

What are you most proud of from your Donoho experience?

Donoho provided a great foundation for collegiate and professional success, but I'm most proud of the lifelong friendships that came out of my time at Donoho! One of those friendships with Jade, grew into dating on August 20, 1997, and then eventually marriage on June 6, 2009...and then Leigha in 2013 and Isla in 2017.

What is your current position and how did Donoho prepare you for your career?

I spend the greatest amount of my professional time as an ophthalmologist. Specifically, I'm a cornea and vision correction specialist, which means I provide eye surgeries to improve vision. That includes cataract surgery, cornea transplants, LASIK, and a wide range of other procedures. Surgery is my favorite part of the work, but clinic time can also be a lot of fun meeting people, planning and following up on surgeries, and treating some conditions medically, as well. I'm also managing partner of my practice, Georgia Eye Partners, which comprises 21 eye doctors across 7 locations in the greater Atlanta area, so there are some administrative and directional aspects to wearing that hat.

When I'm not in clinic or surgery, I am president of Switchboard, M.D., an artificial intelligence startup focused on using natural language processing to help physicians and their teams. I'm also founder and CEO of Regular Rate and Rhythm Software, my mobile software development company under which I've made apps for both medical and non-medical purposes since starting it during the tail-end of medical school in 2008. I've always loved computers and technology; I'll never forget redirecting the class (much to the chagrin of my third grade teacher, Mrs. Mullins) into programming mode in the Apple 2+ computer lab during one of my first few weeks at Donoho.

Donoho was foundational for me to have the knowledge, scores, and varied experiences to successfully attend a prestigious college, cascading from there to medical school, internship, residency, and fellowship. Both matriculating and 'matching' (getting into residency and fellowship) are challenging, with even excellent students sometimes failing to reach the next level in the process. Leadership roles (like editor of the yearbook), AP classes, two-day history tests requiring meticulous memorization, and a social network full of supporting friends and friendly competitors (often overlapping) were all key.

What is something at Donoho that you absolutely loved being a part of?

I had great teachers, but of all their impacts, the most enduring was surely that of Mr. and Mrs. "T." Mrs. Thagard taught me 4th and 5th grade English, and the writing skills I mastered under her have paid immeasurable dividends in the decades since. Mr. Thagard's senior year history class served as an experiential preview for the memorization demands of the first two years of medical school. However; what I 'absolutely loved being a part of' was not just their classes; it was, and is, being a part of their extended family. Their sincere, reciprocated love represented the best a teacher-student relationship could be.

What is your favorite Donoho tradition?

Eating lunch outside between the upper school and cafeteria buildings.

Any advice you would give current Donoho students and families?

Lean into the opportunities to lead and to compete; you may never again have so many possibilities within such a small community which is nonetheless so big and vibrant. Stay focused and get great grades, but don't forget to enjoy your time at Donoho. I certainly did.

Taylor Dawson '10



Taylor earned her bachelor's degree at The University of Alabama. She majored in political science and minored in French. She currently lives in Nashville, Tennessee.

What are you most proud of from your Donoho experience?

I didn't realize it until I was in college, but Donoho set a very high performance standard across the board – in academics, activities, and how we presented ourselves in general. I was naîve enough to believe that everyone was taught that way until I got to college. Learning how to be professional and disciplined in high school allowed me to go into college and my career way ahead of the curve. I have to give a special shout-out here to Mrs. Burrage. I hated (truth be told, still hate) public speaking. But being taught and conditioned on how to write and deliver a speech has served me well, especially with a career in politics.

What is your current position and how did Donoho prepare you for your career?

When I tell people I work in a think tank, I get very confused looks. The Beacon Center of Tennessee educates Tennesseans on public policy issues. We defend our constitutional rights in the courts, and we advocate for free-market, limited-government politics at the state capitol and on the local level. I am the producer and co-host of our weekly podcast "Decaf," and I manage all of our community engagement efforts, including marketing, coalition building, and advocacy. My friends joke that I'm really good at talking to "adults." My ability to build relationships and communicate clearly with the stakeholders we represent was a skill I developed at Donoho, and I wouldn't be able to do my job without it. Going back to my previous response, the ability to communicate professionally was expected of us, and I didn't realize at the time how fortunate I was to be taught how to carry myself in that way at such a young age.

What is something at Donoho that you absolutely loved being a part of?

This is a tie for me: cheerleading and editing the yearbook. I miss Friday nights on the sideline so much, and my cheerleading experience allowed me to be a cheer coach at a small, private school when I lived in Birmingham. Being on the yearbook staff forced me to be organized and taught me graphic design skills that have opened doors for me in my career and allowed me to create a little side hustle, designing wedding suites for my friends and doing projects for other organizations.

What is your favorite Donoho tradition?

I really hope you guys still do this! There was nothing that got me more hyped up than the football players leading "Everywhere We Go" at the end of every pep rally. I say that in the past tense, knowing that to this day if I witnessed it, it would get me just as hyped. Blame it on my competitive nature, but the other team needs to know who we are and that we're coming for them.

Any advice you would give current Donoho students and families?

There has been no other season in my life that I have been able to take advantage of so many opportunities at once. I – and probably a lot of other people – would have called myself an overachiever in high school because I was involved in everything. In retrospect, that motivation came from not wanting to miss out on anything. While you are at Donoho, be as involved as you can be. Get to know everyone while you're in an environment where you can. Rack up all the activities. It'll make you a well-rounded person, and give you great stories to tell.
