I will go ahead and admit my darkest secret as an English teacher: I do not like grammar. Though I can use it and teach it in a workmanlike fashion, I get little joy from dragging my students through the litany regulations for English. It's so difficult to make rules fun, after all. And don't we have enough "logical" regulations without imposing them on the beauty of language?

Despite this tense relationship with grammar, however, teaching grammar has revealed the beauty of precision and labeling to me. Revealing it to my students is another matter. As one perceptive scholar told me, "Why should I be excited about doing math twice a day? I want to read books, not slap names on words." Having been in these students' shoes, I remember what they need: a real-world application to the rules, one which includes both grammar and literature.

As such, I've tested out a semi-weekly event I call "Lit Fridays" in my more grammar-heavy classes. I take two to three excerpts from classic literature and point out the grammar principles which made these books effective. At the same time, I emphasize how each work's historical context and author influenced the way it was written and the many ways people read it. For example, I recently used the beginning of Charles Dickens' novel *Great Expecta-*

tions to review clauses and phrases with the 9th grade. Together, my students and I found a single grammatically correct sentence which extended for eight typed lines and contained seven dependent clauses! As with fashion and politics, writing has fads--and the Victorian period, as we discovered, liked as many words as possible!

Lit Fridays may not be "fun" in the traditional sense, as they still involve grammar rules. But with this method, I hope I can share my true love--literature--while teaching the mechanical principles which will improve my students' own writing!



Having over thirty artists and over fifty works of art in a gallery on a busy street in a big city attracted a diverse audience to the space and raised awareness of the issue of human trafficking."

ence, we were able to attend sessions on a wide variety of topics. We engaged our passion for science by building candy launchers, using forensics techniques, exploring misconceptions in thermodynamics, and using technology and new biotechnological tools to gain a better understanding of biological processes. We delighted in the wisdom of shifting from a structured scientific method to a flexible engineering design process, of seeing how scientific themes and processes are linked through all grade levels and disciplines, of gaining a better understanding of the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), and of learning how to help our students argue scientifically with each other. And we were certainly humbled by the realization of how much there was to learn, but we are also so excited to be walking this path of standards-based, argument-driven teaching. Our experience at NSTA helped equip us for writing our own vertically-aligned K-12 science standards, and we were able to make a well-informed decision for a new K-8 science curriculum, STEMscopes. Even though NSTA was only four days, its impact will continue to make a difference at Donoho, and we will continue to LEAD!

A young boy gets two copper hunting dogs and goes on a life-changing hunt; a scrappy adolescent girl saves her siblings after being abandoned in a parking lot; a misfit orphan

finds his true purpose in the great halls of a wizarding school; these are all the tales of stories which profoundly impacted me as a young reader. The emotions of reading these various tales are still imprinted on me to this day. I can see the tears splattering off the pages, feel the swelling of joy as good triumphed evil, and get lost in the pensiveness of determining my own impact on those around me. Reading not only brings us closer to the stories of others' human experiences, but it brings us closer to our own. We learn about the world through these stories and find or create ourselves from the experiences we have with the characters formulated with black ink printed on ivory paper. Getting to teach children

about reading and share my love of books is a dream come true! Each child has a story to

weave throughout time; no experience is too small or insignificant when seen through the

lens of an inquisitive mind. As my students and I read the interwoven tapestry

of the human experience and add our own threads, we will share our interpreta-

tions and connections by creating various writing pieces throughout the year.

If you were to take a peek into my kindergarten classroom, you would see lots of little bodies in constant motion. What may appear to be chaos to the untrained eye is actually the process of active learning...kindergarten style! It's no secret that young children learn best through play. They need to experience hands-on activities that allow them to explore, question their learning, and think critically about content being taught. We had these elements in mind when researching new science curriculum for the 2016-2017 school year. After giving it a trial run, I was convinced that STEMscopes would fit the needs of my students. Not only are they engaged in fun experiments and projects, but my students are encouraged to share their ideas, make predictions, and back up their claims by applying their knowledge about what we are studying.

When you are having this much fun in your classroom, you want to share it with everyone! The Seesaw app keeps parents informed about what their child is doing in class. What began as simply a tool used to create digital portfolios for my students has evolved into so much more! I am able to share classroom photos, work samples, and assessment results with a click of a button. I also use the audio tool found on the Seesaw app to deliver directions for my students to follow while working at learning stations. After a few practice sessions, my students become "Seesaw Certified" and can independently use the app to document their learning through photos and audio clips. As a teacher, it is so gratifying to listen to my students explain their thinking and describe the process they went through to solve a problem or challenge.



OUTSTANDING ALUMNI



Congratulations to the 2016 Outstanding Alumni!

This year Donoho will honor Daniel H. White from the class of 1985, Daphne Mobley Johnston from the class of 1995, Anna Moore Clifton from the class of 1996, and Eric L. Wallace from the class of 1998.

While this year's recipients span backgrounds ranging from medical research to education to community outreach, they all share a passion for providing leadership in making positive changes in the world.

In her capacity as the executive director of the Respite Ministry at the First United Methodist Church in Montgomery, Johnston has served more than 200 patients with Alzheimer's disease in a little more than five years. She's also trained

more than 400 volunteers throughout Alabama to deal with Alzheimer's, and is currently working to build a state coalition of volunteers with the UAB Neurology Department.

The oldest of the alumni, White, is the founder, president and CEO of Clearside Biomedical, a company specializing in developing drug therapies to treat blinding diseases of the eye. The company has raised more than \$105 million to perform drug development in three programs.

Wallace, the youngest of the alumni, is also working in the medical field as a part of the research faculty at UAB. Dr. Wallace's research has focused on the problems of geographical and socioeconomic barriers preventing patients from getting the care they need. Wallace's research into providing home dialysis through telemedicine and telemoni-

toring technologies established him on the American Society of Nephrology Kidney Health Initiative.

Away from the medical field, Clifton currently serves as the assistant superintendent of teaching and learning at Carrollton City Schools in Georgia. Overseeing a \$45 million budget for a school system of 5000 students, Clifton's leadership improved AdvancED accreditation results in Carrollton in areas of teaching and learning by more than 21 percent over the average score of other districts in the region.

Ask any of the alumni where their passions for being leaders started, and the answer is the same.

"My experience at Donoho was the foundation of my leadership career," Johnston said. "The faculty truly wanted us

to succeed and used every tool to draw out our individual talents just as good leaders do with those they serve."

White, whose mother Jo Anne White taught first grade for more than 30 years at Donoho, said the school provided an opportunity to flourish in a small community with ample support, which he might not have received at larger public schools.

Clifton said whenever she's asked why she chose to work in education her mind "races back to Donoho teachers who every single day gave me their very best."

"The teachers here opened our minds to explore the insanely impossible," Clifton said. "Our minds were fertilized daily with the challenge to think beyond what's possible."

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day entail?

As our family is currently in that busy season of life, my day consists of various activities associated with being a wife, a mom, an educator, and a student. The day begins early as we work to ensure that our three children are ready to meet the challenges ahead of them. Serving as Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning at Carrollton City Schools, I facilitate strategic and school improvement planning, implementation, and monitoring; advance the curriculum and instructional design; oversee the system's \$45.5 million budget; and lead the identification, recruitment and training of our exceptionally, talented human resources. In the evenings, our family shuttles begin as we transport children to and from cheer, karate, golf, and lacrosse practices. The day typically concludes by completing coursework and analyzing research in pursuit of a Doctorate in Educational Administration and Leadership.

How has your life journey been influenced by your time at Donoho?

C.S Lewis once wrote, "The task of the modern educator is not to cut down jungles, but to irrigate deserts." Before becoming a Donoho Falcon, my educational experiences occurred in several places. I attended schools in Anniston, AL, Jacksonville, FL, Indianola, MS, and Maple Grove, MN. It was at The Donoho School, however, where the essence of Lewis' quote took root. The teachers here opened our minds to not only what is, but encouraged us to explore the insanely impossible. Our minds were fertilized daily with the challenge to think beyond what's possible. The weeds of idleness were plucked away as we were taught to challenge ourselves academically, socially and athletically. It was here where I learned about the whole me. The teachers at Donoho inspired me and my classmates to learn and work collaboratively. This approach to education not only prepared me for the academic challenges that awaited but created an environment where class acquaintances evolved into impenetrable lifelong friendships. For this, I am eternally grateful.

What are some words of advice you'd like to share with current Donoho students?

Donoho students, enjoy this time! As you are preparing for the future, glean from the wisdom of others. Several key reminders have served me well over the years, and they are associated with attitude, priorities, vision, and integrity. Life is all about choices. Know what is important; these are your priorities and pay close attention to them. Have a vision for your life; see what is not there yet and pursue it with all you have. Above all, always, always, do what is right even when no one is looking.

I am currently the President and CEO of Clearside Biomedical, an Alpharetta, GA, based pharmaceutical company developing treatments for retinal diseases that are sight threatening. The company was founded in 2011 and is now publically traded under the symbol CLSD. We have 23 employees focused on the development of innovating treatments and are currently in the drug development process with zero sales.


What projects are you currently most excited about?

At Clearside, we are working to design therapies for treating blinding disease. It is not hard to wake up every day with a mission to save people from losing their sight, but it takes

patience and caring to bring a great team of people together on this shared mission. In June of this year, we took the company public to raise the kind of capital it takes for a drug to be developed and approved by the FDA in the US. Everyone in the company must work in unison solving some very complicated scientific questions in order to be successful. We are rewarded when we see life-changing vision improvement in clinical trials, and it reminds us we have an obligation to bring these therapies to the market as soon as possible.

How has your life journey been influenced by your time at Donoho?

I want to acknowledge my mother, Jo Anne White, who was a first grade teacher for 30 plus years. It was through her tireless work and loving support that I was able to attend Donoho School from 3rd through 12th grades. I graduated from Donoho School in 1985. While at the Donoho School, I was able to become a member of the National Honor Society and lettered in Varsity Football and Basketball. The Donoho School provided exposure to advanced classes and education that resulted in an accelerated familiarity in classes I took during my freshman and sophomore years at Auburn University like Biology, History, and Math. Donoho also provided an environment and support where I was able to build confidence and thrive in athletics where in a larger school I would be unlikely to perform. Candidly, I was NOT an all-A, honor-roll student, but with the appropriate environment and hard work, Donoho provided the platform to experience an incredible career and quality life and family.



Dr. Eric L. Wallace, '98

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day entail?

I am currently Assistant Professor of Medicine in the Division of Nephrology at UAB. I am director of the home dialysis program at UAB, associate fellowship program director, and co-director of the Fabry disease and other rare genetic kidney disease clinic at UAB. Furthermore, I have become a leader and advocate in the field of home dialysis and most recently the use of telemedicine in the delivery of distant care.

As far as a typical day. I get up, and with the help of my wife, Eleanor Wallace who is also a physician, get my two-and-a-half-year-old daughter and four-and-a-half-year-old son (have to include the "half" or he would get mad) ready for school. I then go into work and either see patients in clinic or the hospital depending on the month. On months I am not in the

hospital, I dedicate myself to research and writing manuscripts on home dialysis, telemedicine, and some basic science.

How has your life journey been influenced by your time at Donoho?

I think that my life journey has been influenced by Donoho in many ways. Now as an educator, myself, I think that the most important thing is not what is taught but how to learn. Donoho did a fantastic job in teaching how to learn and how to push and challenge yourself. The small size of Donoho was also a huge influence in my life journey. I am and have always been pretty small and very unathletic. However, at Donoho I was allowed to try and compete in anything. In the JV football team, I was a lineman. (I think my job was to trip people as they trampled over me to get to the quarterback.) On the track team, I threw discus. I would not have ever been able to even try these things at a larger school. But by trying, I learned that any skill can be learned with enough dedication and practice. This experience is what has had the most influence. An attitude that if I don't know about something I can learn about it and start doing it.

What are some words of advice you'd like to share with current Donoho students?

I think the biggest thing to share with Donoho students is the following. Never stop. Whenever you have reached one goal, pat yourself on the back. But don't pat yourself on the back for too long. Start thinking about the next step, the next hurdle, the next goal, the next struggle.

Tell us what you do now. What does your typical day entail?

I am the founder and director of the The Respite Ministry, a day program for those with early to mild dementia. Our ministry has not only spread throughout Montgomery, but we have launched five other programs in four cities in Alabama. We fill forty-five volunteer slots a week to run the program Monday-Thursday from 10:00-2:00 pm giving Respite to care partners and purpose to those with Alzheimer's.

What projects are you currently most excited about?

Recently, our program was awarded a 110K dollar grant from a family foundation with hopes of starting multiple programs across the state of Alabama. Our program is working closely with UAB Neurology to spread the volunteer model of care around the southeast. Our program was featured by the Administration on Aging this summer on a national webinar and


from this presentation, The New York State Respite Coalition has highlighted our model and has asked me to speak to over 200 churches on how to build our Alzheimer's ministry in November.





Twould like to take this oppor-Ltunity to update you on some goings-on around the middle/upper school campus. Aesthetically, we have made numerous renovations to our facilities, but to me, the most well-received upgrade has been the College Counseling Center. Situated just outside of Mrs. Gaines' office, this inviting space has been a hit with our seniors. This space is equipped with a computer and printer for completing college admissions applications, comfortable seating,

and work spaces for students. Located just across the hall from the senior lounge, it serves as a visual reminder for all things college applications--including scholarship applications! As a result of the addition of this space, we are experiencing a record-number of college transcript submissions sent by this point of the school year, and we've only just begun!

Physical renovations and upgrades make for a more inviting environment in which to work and learn; however, a hallmark of our school lies in its academics. Many schools use "college-prep" as a descriptor, but how do you define college-prep? I am very proud to share the following accomplishments and information about our school:

- Six dual-enrollment offerings for 2016-2017
- 84% of total students scoring 3 or higher on AP exams-the highest AP results in five years
- · New department-designed, whole-school standards in math and science with English to be completed this year and history in 2017-2018

- Average class size of 14 students
- and an ACT composite score of 27 for the past five years.

I hope you will agree that delighting in wisdom remains paramount for our students and teachers. However, I feel that the best way to assess how well we are preparing our graduates for college is to hear from an alum. Consider these words from alumna Camryn Swain ('16), an engineering student at Auburn University, who took the time to email us about how Donoho prepared her for college:

Studying at Auburn with thousands of people and meeting hundreds of them with different personalities, hobbies, interests, and goals has truly been an eye opening experience. Not only because I've learned to appreciate those around me, but because I've learned to appreciate where I've come from. And the family I came from, was Donoho. I've had to look back at old physics and calculus notes from my senior year. The second lab my

physics class did was an exact replica of one I did in Mrs. Senter's physics class exactly one year ago. College classes obviously go much faster than high school classes, but when the professor skips over information and loses almost everybody, I at least of my high school academics to fall back on. Starting in ninth grade, Mrs. Taylor taught me how to organize my notes and memorize large amounts of data at one time. For two years, Mr. Ford's lectures fine-tuned my entire class' listening and note taking skills. Mr. Connell and Mrs. Otwell picked over my essays and critiqued me until my papers were covered in red ink. Because of that, however, I became a better writer and am now getting 100s on papers in college. All these skills are all coming together now as I enroll in difficult engineering classes. Donoho taught me how to be a leader and an opportunist. During every interview I have had for a job or scholarship, the interviewer is always confused and impressed. He/She asks how I was so well-rounded from robotics, to drama, to sports and my answer is always, "I was given opportunities, so I took them all and ran." I am forever grateful for my Donoho family as they continue to support me even after I have graduated.

Our faculty is blessed to receive correspondence like this all of the time, and it is so rewarding to know that you are part of an organization that is day in and day out truly preparing students for college!
