
The Donoho Parents' Association - never-ending suppliers of time, energy, and valuable resources!

We thank the Donoho Parents' Association from the bottom of our hearts for all they do to make Donoho great!




2016 - 2017 Revenues & Expenditures

Second, Donoho Alums dedicate their time to serving the School. Some



In my twelve years as Director of Fine Arts at Donoho, I have seen exciting and wonderful changes! During my first year, in 2006, only six female students enrolled in my drama class, so we chose *Steel Magnolias* (a show about six women) as our first show! We built a working beauty shop on our small cafetorium stage, and we haven't stopped building and growing ever since!

In 2012, when casting munchkins for *The Wizard Oz*, we had over 100 lower school students audition, and we knew we had outgrown our Donoho cafetorium stage! We initially moved our performances to the Anniston High School Performing Arts Center, but when over 120 students were cast in *The Lion King, Jr.* in 2015, we moved our venue to the Oxford Performing Arts Center to accommodate our colossal cast and crew.

During our production of *The Lion King, Jr.*, something really special began to happen. Students in PK4-12th grades became involved in all aspects of the show. The production was student-driven at every level, with students creating and designing the logo, set, props, and costumes. Seeing our entire school focused on one goal and working together in this way was part of the inspiration behind our new Donoho Arts Collaborative, launched in 2017.

I cannot express the joy I feel watching so many young people fall in love with the stage. Every year, we are graduating students who go on to pursue their dreams in the world of theatre!

Job Shadow: Pediatrics & Research at UAB


